Background

The Diplôme d'études en langue française (DELF) is an internationally recognized certification of proficiency in French for speakers who's first language is not French. The diploma is earned by successfully challenging an exam for one of the four DELF levels. The diploma is valid for life and is recognized internationally. Students in Grand Erie can challenge this exam, facilitated by funding to Ontario school boards from the Ministry of Education. Obtaining DELF certification has numerous advantages for students including providing an advantage for public sector jobs, enhancing a résumé, additional pathway opportunities, further study of French in post-secondary, becoming competitive with the international workforce that is typically multilingual, as well as creating an internationally recognizable identification of a student's language learning accomplishments and abilities.

Grand Erie provides opportunities for students in all three (3) French as a Second Language (FSL) programs (Core, Immersion and Extended French) to participate in the DELF during the year that they study a Grade 12 level French course. The DELF evaluations provide students with the opportunity to demonstrate their proficiency in the same four components as our Ontario FSL Curriculum: Listening, Reading, Writing and Speaking. Students challenge the exam that corresponds with their level of proficiency in French. Grand Erie students can choose from levels B2, B1 and A2:

- **A2** indicates the ability to communicate socially about simple routine tasks using common expressions, to understand short dialogues and discussions, and to read simple texts.
- **B1** indicates the ability to independently describe experiences, provide reasons for opinions, understand everyday conversations and announcements, read factual texts, and write letters or short essays.
- **B2** indicates the ability to communicate independently with spontaneity and some fluency, express a supported opinion or point of view, understand longer dialogues such as interviews or reports, analyse articles on contemporary issues, and write a well-structured essay.

Each component is evaluated out of 25 points. Students must achieve a minimum of five (5) out of 25 points on each component, with a total of 50 out of 100 points to earn certification in their pre-selected DELF level.

In 2024-2025, 95 students participated in the DELF evaluation, representing 86% all students enrolled in Gr. 12 FSL courses. 88% of these students were successful in obtaining DELF certification.

Eighteen Grand Erie educators, who are DELF qualified *Examinateur-Correcteurs*, conducted and evaluated all parts of the exam (oral interviews, listening, reading, and writing components) along with the assistance of two external *Examinateur-Correcteurs*.

Implementation of the DELF exam is part of Grand Erie's strategy to increase the percentage of students studying FSL until graduation under the provincial FSL Framework Action Plan.

Additional Information

Three (3) additional Grand Erie educators obtained their DELF Examinateur-Correcteur qualifications in 2024-2025, bringing our total to 25. The training for this qualification is a valuable professional learning experience. It involves four (4) days of moderated marking and professional dialogue around assessment practices linked to precise, pre-established criteria.

Next Steps

In 2025-2026, Grand Erie will offer all three (3) levels of the exams (B2, B1, A2), at all three (3) timelines for DELF exam opportunities: November, April, and May. Sessions will be scheduled at locations throughout the district to provide equity of access for all students.

Background

The Grand Erie District School Board (Grand Erie) has formalized its International Student Program (ISP), offering global learners' opportunities to study in Canada. The program supports diverse student pathways including graduation, English language development, intercultural learning, and short-term experiences.

Strategic Partnerships

A key component of ISP's success is the ongoing collaboration with recruitment agents who promote Grand Erie in international markets such as Spain, Vietnam, India, Japan, Germany, and emerging regions like Nigeria and Kenya. These partnerships are vital for expanding reach and ensuring a steady growth in student enrolment.

Community Collaboration

Grand Erie works closely with participating schools and community partners to provide a welcoming and supportive environment. Participating secondary schools in Brantford and Brant County offer multilingual supports, leadership opportunities, and access to clubs and sports. The district has secured Muskoka Language International (MLI) as a homestay partner to ensure safe, enriching placements for students, including custodianship and health insurance services.

Student Orientation

To ensure a smooth transition, Grand Erie has implemented a comprehensive orientation program for international students upon arrival. This session introduces students to their school community, academic expectations, and available supports, fostering a sense of belonging and setting the stage for a successful experience.

Program Goals

International students enroll abroad for many reasons, some of which include participation in exchange programs, short-term stays necessitated by their parents'/caregivers' employment or education in Canada, a desire to experience Canada and learn English, or graduate from secondary school. The goals of the ISP include:

- Promoting intercultural exchange and diversity within schools
- Showcasing Ontario's education system globally
- Increasing enrolment and revenue to reinvest in student programming
- Building long-term relationships with students, families, and agents

Current Status

Nine (9) international students from Switzerland, Japan and Spain are currently enrolled across three (3) secondary schools. Nine (9) additional students from Japan are expected to arrive soon for a short term stay to experience Canada and learn English.

Next Steps (2025-26)

- Continue agent recruitment and market expansion
- Maintain competitive fee structure
- Enhance ISP website and marketing materials
- Strengthen orientation and transition supports

Background

Grand Erie's Long-Term Accommodation Plan (LTAP), 2025-2030, includes a set of Guiding Principles to frame decisions of the board. The following principles (LTAP, p. 45) guided the outcome of this report:

- put students first;
- support a range of programs in elementary and secondary schools; and
- provide access to sustainable, quality and equitable public education in every school.

Historically, Tollgate Technological Skills Centre (TTSC) has offered programming for students interested in entering the workplace directly after secondary school. Many of the course options included technology courses which were open to students primarily in the City of Brantford. TTSC does not have a designated boundary but rather has accepted students interested in the programming offered at the site.

Enrolment

This year, there are 119 students enrolled at TTSC. Enrolment figures have decreased since the 2020-21 school year.

Since the early 2000s, secondary schools have offered an increasing number of technology courses thereby providing students in all pathways (apprenticeship, college, university and workplace) with opportunities to take technology courses at their designated home schools. Access to desired courses in closer proximity to their homes may account for declining enrolment at TTSC.

Course Offerings

Student enrolment drives staffing and course offerings in the secondary panel. In 2025-26, 40 Grade 10 students are enrolled at TTSC. Student enrolment has resulted in TTSC offering 13 Grade 10 courses (10 non-technology and three (3) technology), two (2) of which are half credits (Civics and Careers) and three (3) of which are Arts courses (Visual Art, Crafts, and Ceramics). Also of note is that, due to timetabling restrictions, two (2) of the technology courses

(Hospitality and Hairstyling) are offered at the same time, effectively reducing the number of course options for Grade 10 students to 12 courses.

Focus Group Feedback

In 2024-25, students from TTSC were given an opportunity to participate in a focus group. Broad themes emerged related to programs. These included a desire for the following:

- More arts-based courses (e.g., Music, Drama, Musical Theatre, Drawing and Photography)
- Engines and trade courses that are more up-to-date and modernized for the real world
- Indigenous languages, Culture and History
- Cultural language courses so that they could learn more about their own culture
- Parenting classes; coding classes; more academic classes in core subjects so they have options other than Co-operative Education
- Sports Clubs throughout the year and Sports Teams
- More guidance on future pathway planning

In addition, some staff participated in a separate focus group. Their feedback included wanting to collaborate with colleagues who teach the same subjects as there are few staff at TTSC who teach the same courses thereby limiting co-planning and co-teaching. Staff also commented on the inability to run courses as there are too few students to make running the courses viable. One comment included, "there are so few course options available to students that they are unable to pursue all of their interests". Other comments included recognizing that if new courses are offered, other courses would need to cease being offered due to low enrolment.

Given the feedback provided, the decrease in enrolment at TTSC may be a result of students registering at their designated home schools in order to access a greater breadth of course offerings (non-technology and technology courses) as illustrated in the 2025-26 chart below.

Summary

Enrolment data, course offerings at all schools within Brant County/Brantford and Focus Group feedback have provided valuable insights. Therefore, to support increased programming opportunities for students, effective September 2026, there will be no Grade 10 intake for the program at Tollgate Technological Skills Centre. Students will continue to register at their designated home schools.

To support thriving school communities through School Councils within Grand Erie District School Board (Grand Erie).

Policy Statement:

Grand Erie will establish and support School Councils in their work to promote and improve student achievement, well-being and belonging through collaboration with parent(s)/caregiver(s), employees and communities.

- 1.0 Each school in Grand Erie shall establish a School Council.
- 2.0 Parent(s)/caregiver(s) shall constitute a majority of members of the School Council.
- 3.0 School Councils shall provide an annual report of activities to Grand Erie. The report must be submitted to Director's Services by the end of June each year.
- 4.0 School elections shall be held within the first 30 days of the school year. In the case of a new school, for which a School Council has not been established, School Council elections shall be held within the first 30 days of the school's operation.
- 5.0 Grand Erie shall provide each School Council with an annual amount determined through its budget deliberation process. Members and Officers of School Councils who incur expenses as members of the Council must be reimbursed from this annual amount.
- 6.0 Grand Erie, with support from the Grand Erie Parent Involvement Committee (GEPIC), shall organize an annual School Council Orientation workshop and must invite all School Council Chairs.
- 7.0 Grand Erie may solicit input on any matter, but shall solicit the views of the School Councils through the School Council Chairs' email distribution list with respect to policies and guidelines for the following matters:
 - the conduct of persons in schools within Grand Erie's jurisdiction
 - appropriate dress for pupils in schools within Grand Erie's jurisdiction
 - the allocation of funding by Grand Erie to School Councils
 - the fundraising activities of School Councils
 - the conflict resolution processes for internal School Council disputes
 - the Grand Erie's Multi Year Strategic Plan/Annual Learning and Operating Plan
 - process and criteria applicable to the selection and placement of School Administrators
 - may comment on any matter to Grand Erie by writing a letter to the Chair of the Board following the process for delegations

- 3.0 The Board of Trustees may select one of the names recommended. However, the Board of Trustees reserves the right to make the final decision, notwithstanding the recommendation from the Naming/Renaming Committee.
